What do you know about some issue?

heart

What do you care about? Why?





hands

What skills do you have/need, to make a difference?

personal statement (statement of purpose)

- generally for grad school or grant applications
- often open-ended, though they may give a prompt
- ~500-750 words is common, but check requirements

- why you care about the subject
- what you bring to the issue
- how the program will help you

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 - → share your unique skillset & background
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- how the program will help you
 → visualize specifics about being there

personal statement: structure

- Paragraph 1: Story Drop
 - set the scene with a dramatic narrative
 - make them want to read more about how this ties to them
- Middle Paragraphs: Background
 - demonstrating that you have the academic and interpersonal capabilities they are asking for
 - specific anecdotes about experiences that showcase what you know, care about, and want to learn more about
- Final Paragraph: Connecting to them
 - name specific people/projects you want to work with and courses/programs you are interested in
 - talk about how you'll contribute to their community

cover letters (may also be email)

- generally for job applications
- often respond to a specific job advertisement
- ~350 words stick to 1 page, unless otherwise told

connecting your capacities to what they need done

- read the job description carefully
- consider that description like a rubric
- identify what they want and are asking for



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 → identify skills, duties, and values

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 → identify skills, duties, and values

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 → respond directly to it, point by point
 identify what they want and are asking for
 → be clear how you can give it to them

cover letter: structure

- Paragraph 1: Values Matching
 - why you want this job; what you're passionate about.
 - ...and how this ties to their goals!
- Paragraphs 2-4(ish): Skills Matching
 - demonstrating that you have the capabilities they are asking for
 - specific anecdotes/experiences that showcase what you can do
- Final Paragraph: Looking Ahead
 - reiteration of goals matching and how you look forward to working with them
 - what you're hoping they'll do and next steps (consider contact info, interview, etc.)
